The Domestic Abuse Strategy is the first strategy for Westmorland and Furness District that focuses on improving our services for people who are or have been affected by domestic abuse, and on improving our response to people who cause harm through domestic abuse.

The strategy describes what Westmorland and Furness will do over the next five years to ensure people affected by domestic abuse receive the best possible care, and how we will continue to seek the involvement of people with lived experience of domestic abuse in the design and evaluation of domestic abuse services.

The strategy is based on three strategic themes:

- Protection and Support Keeping victims, survivor's, and their families' safe whilst challenging the behaviour of perpetrators.
- Prevention Early intervention and prevention to reduce the cycle of abuse and prevention of repeat occurrences of domestic abuse.
- Promotion of a Stronger System To identify and strive to eradicate Domestic Abuse from our Communities we require strategies for community change and improvement.

The Strategy incorporates activity plans that will support us to succeed, these plans will be reviewed annually

The strategy will make a difference for our children and young people, residents, communities, service users and patients, for our own staff who provide services and support, and it will also make a difference to the way we engage and work with our partners in statutory and non-statutory sectors. All of this will ensure a more joined up, consistent, compassionate, and timely approach to domestic abuse across Westmoreland and Furness.

For the launch of the Domestic Abuse Strategy, a short film was developed, the film demonstrates the Partnership is committed to implementing a coordinated response to all domestic abuse. The video showcases the need for this strategy by telling the story of a female domestic abuse survivor while acknowledging gender differentiation, gender equality and that Domestic abuse does not limit its self to a particular gender. It goes through some of what and how local services provide support and highlights why it's important you reach out if you find yourself impacted by domestic abuse.

Research evidence's the importance of prevention and early intervention. We therefore commit to

- Getting in front of the cycle of Domestic Abuse by reducing repeat occurrences of domestic abuse, especially in the first 30 days after a DA incident.
- Understanding trauma informed, TI Cumbria
- Utilise evidence-based interventions at an early stage
- Hold perpetrators to account and address their behaviour and focus on the high harm perpetrators

PROTECTION & Support- Keeping survivors and their families safe whilst challenging the behaviour of perpetrators.

Working with our survivor networks to enhance our understanding: -

- Of everyday challenges felt by survivors and their children, families, and communities
- We will take each issue and work with agencies to address.



- Trauma awareness and support for workforce supporting perpetrators. Trauma awareness of perpetrators
- Criminal legislation applied consistently Utilise MATAC
- -We will undertake a series of audits with our providers noting staff are educated and have applied learning from DARDRDARDRS. We will deliver a road show of events to raise awareness, working alongside champions and practitioner networks
- We will develop and have clear KPIs.
- Education and awareness, behaviours and cultures is a lifelong continuum of activity. We will think differently in our approach
- Victims & survivors of DA can be supported in the workplace and give employers confidence and knowledge to do so
- We access funds that will drive our plan

Change we will see

Schools recognised as a key partner in ending the cycle of DA.

Schools have more confidence and multiagency support to respond to children's needs.

All children understand schools provide a trusted safe space for disclosure.

Housing is acknowledged as a key partner in ending the cycle of DA. Their workforce are confident and well placed to open up conversations and provide safe space for disclosure

DwP polices are fully aligned to the needs of Domestic Abuse survivors.

- -Programmes impact demonstrated
- We end repeat DA perpetrator offenses
- We understand Perpetrator violence may be behavioural response to previous trauma and act accordingly
- Society is more aware, and we note a change in attitudes and behavioural responses to Domestic abuse
- Providers know and are consistent in their response to DA. Networks strongly influence
- We have learnt from DARDRs and prevented serious incidents
- Public sector agencies have a zero tolerance to DA within their workforce.

By 2028 we will be able to demonstrate that we have improved how we identify protect, educate, and support those experiencing Domestic Abuse and that we have reduce repeat perpetrator offenses from our communities
